Context and Importance of the Seminar

Nelson Mandela Said, "Education is the most powerful weapon, which you can use to change the world." When the world is busy getting equipped with deadly arms and weapons, it is very important to understand that education is the real asset that can develop a nation as well as an individual. People and leaders across the world should join hands to make education, not only a fundamental right for all, but also the guiding light, which can take mankind ahead through any phase of darkness. Education, is a source of better income and employment opportunities, it has much value for social development as an imperative for the development of human capital. That is why it is considered to be the most vital part of development economics. But South Asian policy makers paid merely a lip service to this area. In this region the demographic pattern poses a key challenges for human development since the population as more than doubled during the last three decades. This population could have become the real wealth of these nations, if sufficient investment had been made in developing human capital. Human resource development is the most deprived area in South Asia and this region spends less than five percent of its combined GNP on education and health which is one of the lowest even in the developing countries. In global context. South Asia has been the least developed region of the world, both in terms of its income and human developments index.

Again, it is essential to understand the relationship between health and education and its effect on human development in the developing world. Human capital in its broadest sense encompasses the levels of education, health and nutrition of the population. Few processes are as intertwined with the development as human capital accumulation. Education increases productivity, speeds technological advancements, and increases the probability of more healthy productive children, all of which promotes economic development. Growth, in turn, incentivizes investment in human capital. Vol. (2012) states that 'Casual links point in every direction, traversing phases of the

lifecycle as well as generations'1. It is therefore, no wonder that governments of developing countries increasingly concern themselves with the underinvestment by the poor in health and education. Here lies the importance of the topic so that this seminar may suggest some policies which should be given priority by the Government to upgrade country's Human Development Index.
